The Thinking Computer!

Philips announce a Videogames First! Videopacs 27, 28 and 29 have a unique feature. When you play against the computer it adjusts its skill level to yours: the better you get, the harder the computer plays. Number 25: three games—'Slalom', 'Giant Slalom' and 'Down-hill racing' let you organise your own Alpine competition.

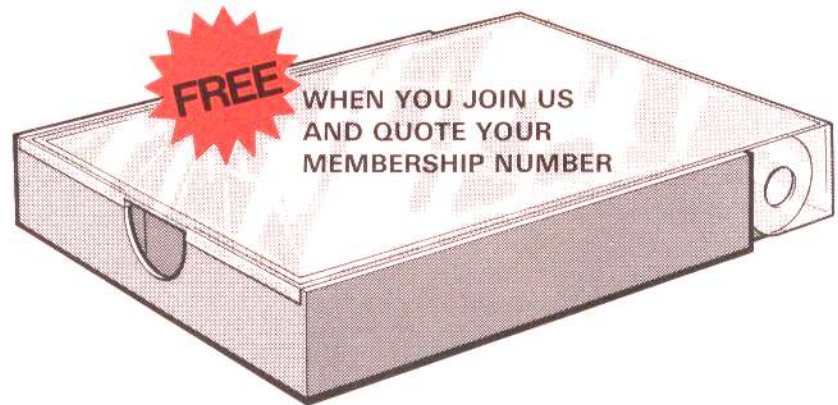

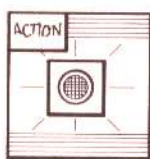
"Dear Sirs,

We replied:

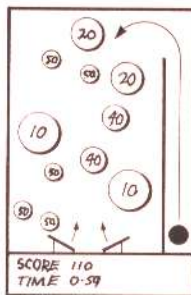
"We thank you for your recent letter

John Davison of Swinton Rise, Ravens-
head, Nottingham, was reading our minds
when he wrote to us in May this year:

"I have an idea for 2 more Videopacs. The
first is snooker—you can have 2 players,
one red, the other yellow. When the men
are walking they are seen from the top,
then an eye-level view when each man is
shooting. To shoot you could have bleeps
—one bleep short, 2 bleeps a bit harder,
and so on until 10 which is a really hard
shot. The computer keeps the score in the
top corner. And also could you invent
some sort of Adventure Game like Atari's.
Also do you think there will be a Philips
Video Computers owners' club with
Philips official bulletins? And finally
could you send me a brochure on brand
new cartridges (after number 26)."

"Many thanks for your ideas on Games for
the G7000. In fact, you have been thinking
