Ever dreamed of being a financial whizkid, making fortunes through your skilful manipulation of the international money scene?

Now this stunning new video-board game from Philips, for one or more players, gives you your chance to exercise your quick wits and steady nerve to do just that – or face financial ruin! As you gain confidence and knowledge you can progress to no fewer than four levels of skill.

Build up your portfolio of fun and Wall Street action with your Philips G7000!

The Great Wall Street Fortune Hunt is an authentic computerised model of the

real world of high finance, with thousands of investment alternatives. Among your options are 'safe' bluechips like IBM; the aircraft, ballistic missile and space systems manufacturer Lockheed, McDonalds' fast-food chain or high-flying, high-risk consortiums like WOW (Wildcat Oil Western).

Each investor (or syndicate if a number of people play) starts with \$100,000 and can enter a maximum number of 7 investments into the computer through the G7000 keyboard. Invest wisely – because if your funds drop below \$25,000 your power to invest is withdrawn and you can only sell.





The full-colour gameboard helps you keep track of your investments – and of time. The timeframe marker represents the 5-year span of each game, marked in quarters of a year. Each of your investments must be sold within one year – so keep an eagle eye on the turn of events!

On-screen your investment choices and current prices travel across the top – whilst urgent news flashes across the centre. These newsflashes will have

varying effects on your investments, depending on their particular sensitivity (to fluctuations in interest rates, political upheavals, etc.), so keep up with current events if you want to stay on top. The bottom of the screen shows your investment portfolio, keeping track of your shares and capital. You access this through your joystick.

You can audit other players if you suspect their investments exceed their net worth – if you're right they are prevented from dealing for an entire quarter.



Transmit your secret messages in real

morse code

Philips new 'Morse Code' videopac could be the answer to all your topsecret communication problems with close friends, partners or associates! It teaches you, character by character, the genuine, internationally-used Morse Code invented around 150 years ago by American painter/inventor Samuel Finley Breese Morse. After easy-stage, 10-minute 'lessons' you'll be able to transmit and transcribe messages using your Philips videogame and TV screen - and the computer makes learning great fun by incorporating a scoring game which challenges your increasing speed and accuracy.

The Morse Alphabet

Characters and figures are replaced by different combinations of dots and dashes – ie short and long signals or 'time units'. This means Morse can be used for light and sound signals, as well as the original electric pulses transmitted by wire.

Learning the Philips way

The videopac Morse 'Menu' gives you these options:

(1) A step-by-step course in recognising Morse signals (ABC).

(2) Transcribing characters and figures into Morse Code (CW 1). CW stands for 'continuous wave' and is used internationally to indicate Morse Code. The loudspeaker symbol signifies that the code is audible via the loudspeaker.

(3) Translating complete messages into Morse Code (CW ◀ M). This is the same as (2), but the M denotes memory. Up to 125 symbols (including word spaces) can be stored in the computer memory.

(4) Sending messages in Morse (). The first symbol stands for Morse key. Pip reminds you that it's your turn to take action!

Signal at a speed that suits your skill

In each of the four MENU options the computer asks you which speed you wish to progress at. As a beginner you

will choose the lowest speed – 4 words a minute – but as you gain confidence you can challenge the computer at its maximum speed – 30 words a minute!


During the 10-minute 'lessons' of option 1 the top of your TV screen shows a line of trees. Each time you correctly identify a Morse signal and press the correct corresponding key, Pip leaps out and chops one down for you!

Practising your message

You use the action button of your left hand control as your Morse key. Though not as sensitive as an official key, it is perfectly adequate at the lower speeds and your Philips computer helps by allowing you to exaggerate your short dots and long dashes!




ELECTRONIC BILLIARDS

Eat your heart out, Pot Black! Now every Philips Videogame owner can play their own TV billiards!

Two realistic versions of popular American pocket billiards games will hold your entire family enthralled around the TV screen! Two players at a time play either 'Eight Ball' or 'Rotation', in both games determining the direction of shot by moving the cue with the joystick. The longer the action button is pressed the further the ball travels, but once it hits another ball the player loses control of its momentum. Your computer works out its most likely trajectory.

In 'Eight Ball' one of the 2 dark-coloured balls in a triangle of 10 balls must be pocketed. First to do it wins.

'Rotation' does not differentiate in value between light and dark balls. You simply take turns to pot as many as you can, the winner being he or she who pots most. One of the many variations possible with 'Rotation' is the option to give different colour balls greater or smaller values. And of course your Philips Videogame keeps an on-screen tally of the current score. Is there a Steve Davis in the house?

Down from the black void Flashing steel claws A valiant pilot's Attention draws.


The eyes of an eagle And nerves of steel A button marked Fire The pilot can feel.
